





#### ACCESSIBILITY BY THE NUMBERS



Students, parents and school staff who need accessible school sites have a right to access schools that can meet their mobility, vision and hearing needs.




# The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)

The ADA is an anti-discrimination statute. It protects the rights of all people with disabilities to receive services, and participate in programs, and activities at public sites, including school buildings.



#### Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act

504 is another anti-discrimination act. It requires that people with disabilities must be included at any program or activity that gets funding from the Federal government.





## The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA)

The IDEA addresses the rights of students who have disabilities that affect their ability to learn and requires school districts to create and implement an Individualized Education Program ("IEP") that will allow students to make progress and be challenged in the least restrictive environment.



## Finding Accessible Schools

 In NYC, some public schools are fully accessible meaning that students can use all parts of the building.

Others are "partially" or "functionally accessible" meaning that key parts of the building are
accessible and meet federal legal standards, but
not all parts.
